WHAT does GSEC do?


Brings CEOs and public leaders together to create one regional economic strategy, with an emphasis on elevating the region's global competitiveness

From Funding Challenges to Delivery Innovations



- Many states are addressing funding shortfalls through creative legislation, partnerships and delivery innovation
- The real challenge isn't just *securing funding*—it's *deploying it effectively*
- Private partners can help bridge policy, delivery and stakeholder alignment to turn funding into outcomes
- Examples:
 - Tennessee's choice to innovate without new taxes
 - Georgia's delivery-driven model
 - Virginia's proven P3 record





The Tennessee Story: Solving the Funding Equation without New Taxes



- Challenge: \$26B needed to address congestion, \$1.2B annual work program, \$500M in new construction
- What they didn't want to do:
 - Do nothing
 - Raise the gas tax
 - Issue road debt
 - Spend more in urban areas at the detriment of rural regions
 - Reduce road and maintenance budget
 - Have toll roads
- Solutions: Public-Private Partnerships (P3) to implement priced managed lanes





Georgia's Transportation Funding Act: A Foundation for Delivery



- 2015 Transportation Funding Act provided a sustainable revenue stream via fuel taxes and fees
- Created the fiscal foundation for major corridor investments like SR 400
 Express Lanes
- Georgia used consistent funding + innovative delivery to accelerate timelines
- Early engagement and data-driven planning helped mitigate public risk while enabling private innovation
- Results: 15 miles of express lanes, \$11B package includes the largest TIFIA loan ever issued, \$4B D&C with \$4B concession deal








SR 65 Widening






SR 65 Widening – BUILD Grant

Construction estimated for Spring of 2027







- Construct Phase 1 with BUILD Grant
- Add Tolled Express Lanes in middle of SR 65 from Galleria Blvd. to Lincoln Blvd.
 - With no tax financing to complete SR 65 Improvements, tolling will have to be considered



Breakdown of the 'One Big Beautiful Bill' (OBBB)

- > A sweeping budget reconciliation bill signed into law on July 4, 2025
- > Passed narrowly in both chambers: House (218-214) and Senate (51-50) with VP Vance casting the tie-breaking vote

Key Highlights:

1. Tax & Economic Provisions –

- ✓ Permanent extension of 2017 tax cuts
- Eliminates taxes on tips, overtime pay, etc.
- Makes permanent 100% expensing for capital investments
- ✓ Immediate amortization for R&D.

2. Border Security & Immigration

- ✓ Largest border security investment in history (over \$140-\$175 billion allocated)
- ✓ Infrastructure completion of 701 miles of primary wall and 900 miles of river barriers
- Hiring 3,000 new Border Patrol agents & 5,000 customs officers
- ✓ Funds for removals and detention capacity for 100,000 individuals daily



Breakdown of the 'One Big Beautiful Bill' (OBBB) cont.

Key Highlights:

3. Social Programs

- ✓ SNAP reform
- ✓ Medicaid requirements adds work requirements, removes estimated 1.4 million non-citizens from coverage

4. Energy & Climate

- ✓ Repeals Green New Deal elements rescinds the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fud and phases out IRA subsidies.
- ✓ Energy Dominance mandates quarterly oil and gas lease sales, reinstates leasing in Alaska & federal lands
- ✓ NEPA reform accelerating permitting for critical projects

5. Fiscal Impact

- ✓ Raises the debt ceiling limit by \$4 trillion
- ✓ Significant changes to student loan borrowing limits

6. Healthcare

- ✓ Medicaid cuts & changes
- ✓ Significant ACA marketplace changes potential for millions in loss of coverage






Road to 2026 Mid-Term Elections



Direction of the Country - Right vs. Wrong


